FOLLOW THESE SAFETY RULES

If flooding occurs, **get to higher ground**. Get out of areas subject to flooding. These include dips, low spots, canyons, and normally dry washes.

Avoid roads already flooded.

Road may be washed out under flood waters. *Turn Around Don't Drown* when you encounter a flooded road.

If heavy rain is forecast or occurring, move your camp site and vehicle away from streams and washes.

Be especially cautious when driving at night when it is harder to recognize flood dangers.

FLOODING AHEAD TURN AROUND DON'T DROWN

Many drivers over estimate their ability to navigate flooded roads, putting too much stock in their "heavy" vehicles.

In reality, most motorists **lose control** of their vehicles, <u>including SUVs</u>, in **just six inches of water**, while <u>18-24 inches of moving water will force a vehicle off the road.</u>

The menace is buoyant force. When the buoyant force is greater than the vehicle's weight, the vehicle will move with the moving water.

Besides the buoyant force, erosion is another significant concern. Moving water is very powerful and can undermine the integrity of a road. A motorist will be unaware he is driving into a scoured out section of the road. <complex-block>

Disaster Services—Your Family Disaster Plan

Disaster can strike quickly and without warning. It can force you to evacuate your neighborhood or confine you to your home. What would you do if basic services-water, gas, electricity or telephones-were cut off? Local officials and relief workers will be on the scene after a disaster, but they cannot reach everyone right away.

Families can-and do-cope with disaster by preparing in advance and working together as a team. Follow the steps listed below to create your family's disaster plan. Knowing what to do is your best protection and your responsibility.

4 Steps to Safety

- 1. Find Out What Could Happen to You
- Contact your local Red Cross chapter or emergency management office-be prepared to take 🛛 🌧 ۰ notes.
- ۲ Ask what types of disasters are most likely to happen. Request information on how to prepare for each
- Learn about your community's warning signals: what they sound like and what you should do when you hear them.
- Ask about animal care after a disaster. Animals are not allowed inside emergency shelters because of health regulations.
- Find out how to help elderly or disabled persons, if needed.
- Find out about the disaster plans at your workplace, your children's school or day care center, and other places where your family spends time.

2. Follow these steps to create your family's disaster plan

- Meet with your family and discuss why you need to prepare for disaster. Explain the dangers of fire, severe weather, and earthquakes to children. Plan to share responsibilities and work together as a team.
- ۲ Discuss the types of disasters that are most likely to happen. Explain what to do in each case.
- ۲ Pick two places to meet:
 - **Outside your home or a neighbors house, school, church, etc. in case of a sudden emergency, like a fire
- Ask an out of State friend to by your "family contact". After a disaster, it's often easier to call long distance. Other family members should call this person and tell them where they are. Everyone must know your contact's phone number.
- Discuss what to do in an evacuation. Plan how to take care of your pets.

3. Complete This Checklist

- Post emergency telephone numbers by phones (fire, police, ambulance, etc.) ۲
- Teach children how and when to call 9-1-1 or your local Emergency Medical Services number for emergency help.
- ۲ Show each family member how and when to turn off the water, gas, and electricity at the main switches.
- Check if you have adequate insurance coverage.
- Get training from the fire department for each family member on how to use the fire extinguisher (ABC type), and show them where it's kept.
- Install smoke detectors on each level of your home, especially near bedrooms. -
- * Conduct a home hazard hunt.
- Stock emergency supplies and assemble a Disaster Supply Kit. ۰
- ۲ Take a Red Cross first aid and CPR class.
- ۰ Determine the best escape routes from your home. Find two ways out of each room.
- ۰ Find the safe places in your home for each type of disaster.

4. Practice and Maintain Your Plan

- ۰ Quiz your kids every six months so.
- Conduct fire and emergency evacuation. ۰
- ۰ Replace stored water every six months and stored food every six months.
- ۰ Test and recharge your fire extinguisher (s) according to manufacturer's instructions.
- ۰ Test your smoke detectors monthly and change the batteries at least once a year.

Basic Disaster Supplies

There are six basics you should stock in your home:

Water

Food

Note: Be sure to include a manual can opener.

- Ready-to-eat canned meats. fruits and vegetables
- Canned juices, milk, soup (if powdered, store extra water)
- Staples--sugar, salt, pepper
- High energy foods--peanut butter, jelly, crackers, granola bars, trail mix
- ۰ Vitamins
- Foods for infants, elderly persons or persons with special dietary needs
- ۲ Comfort/stress foods--cookies, hard candy, sweetened cereals, lollipops, instant coffee, tea bags
- First aid supplies
- ۲ Sterile adhesive bandages in assorted Needle sizes
- 2-inch sterile gauze pads (4-6)
- 4-inch sterile gauze pads (4-6)
- Hypoallergenic adhesive tape
- ۰ Triangular bandages (3)
- ۰ 2-inch sterile roller bandages (3 rolls)
- ۰ 3-inch sterile roller bandages (3 rolls)
- Scissors
- ۰ Tweezers

Non-prescription drugs

- Aspirin or non-aspirin pain reliever
- Anti-diarrhea medication
- ۲
- Syrup of Ipecac (use to induce vomiting if advised by the Poison Control Center)
- Activated charcoal (use if advised by the Poison Control Center)
- Clothing, bedding and sanitation supplies
- Tools
- Special items •

Keep the items that you would most likely need during an evacuation in an easy-to-carry container. Possible containers include a large, covered trash container; a camping backpack; or a duffle bag.
